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FOREWORD

This year, the Nebraska College Preparatory Academy celebrates 15 years preparing first-generation and low-income students for academic success. What started as a pilot program with 52 students has expanded into a model of college access and success that continues to serve hundreds of scholars. Meanwhile, graduates of NCPA have pursued graduate school, been accepted into professional schools or have started successful careers.

NCPA scholars have proven educational success is achievable no matter the circumstances with the right academic and social support.

Although the COVID-19 pandemic continues to present challenges for people and communities around the world, we are profoundly proud of how NCPA scholars persevered. This report recognizes the accomplishments of the past year and reflects upon how NCPA has evolved during the past 15 years.

Last year, NCPA high school scholars met and exceeded program expectations. In total, 86 NCPA seniors completed the NCPA's high school requirements, making it the largest and most diverse cohort in the program's history. The class of 2021 achieved numerous awards and recognitions – 17 Regent Scholars, Nebraska Achievement Scholars, Emerging Leader Scholars, D.J. Hero Awards, to name a few. Furthermore, 100% of the class of 2021 plans to enroll at a community college or four-year university. In addition, younger NCPA high school scholars participated in more than 180 remote and in-person events, illustrating their commitment by meeting obligations set by the NCPA program and their respective high schools.

At the University of Nebraska–Lincoln, 32 first-year college scholars participated in the Summer Institute, NCPA's early move-in program. The scholars had additional time to transition to campus, learn COVID-19 protocols, and meet faculty, staff and peer leaders. 17 college scholars earned a 4.0 GPA, and 45% earned a 3.5 or higher GPA. Furthermore, we celebrated 12 scholars who earned their bachelor's degrees during the in-person graduation ceremony at Memorial Stadium! We invite you to review the numerous honors our college scholars achieved during the 2020-2021 academic year on page 17.

As we look forward to next year, we are mindful of the challenges that exist and aware of the opportunities to make a lasting impact. Thank you for your continued support of the Nebraska College Preparatory Academy.

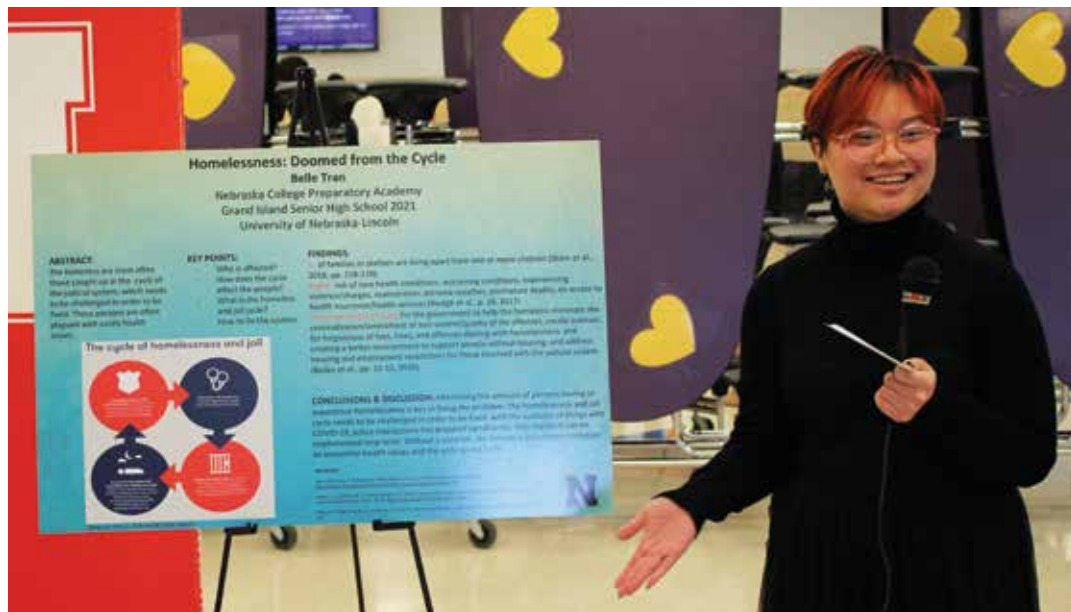

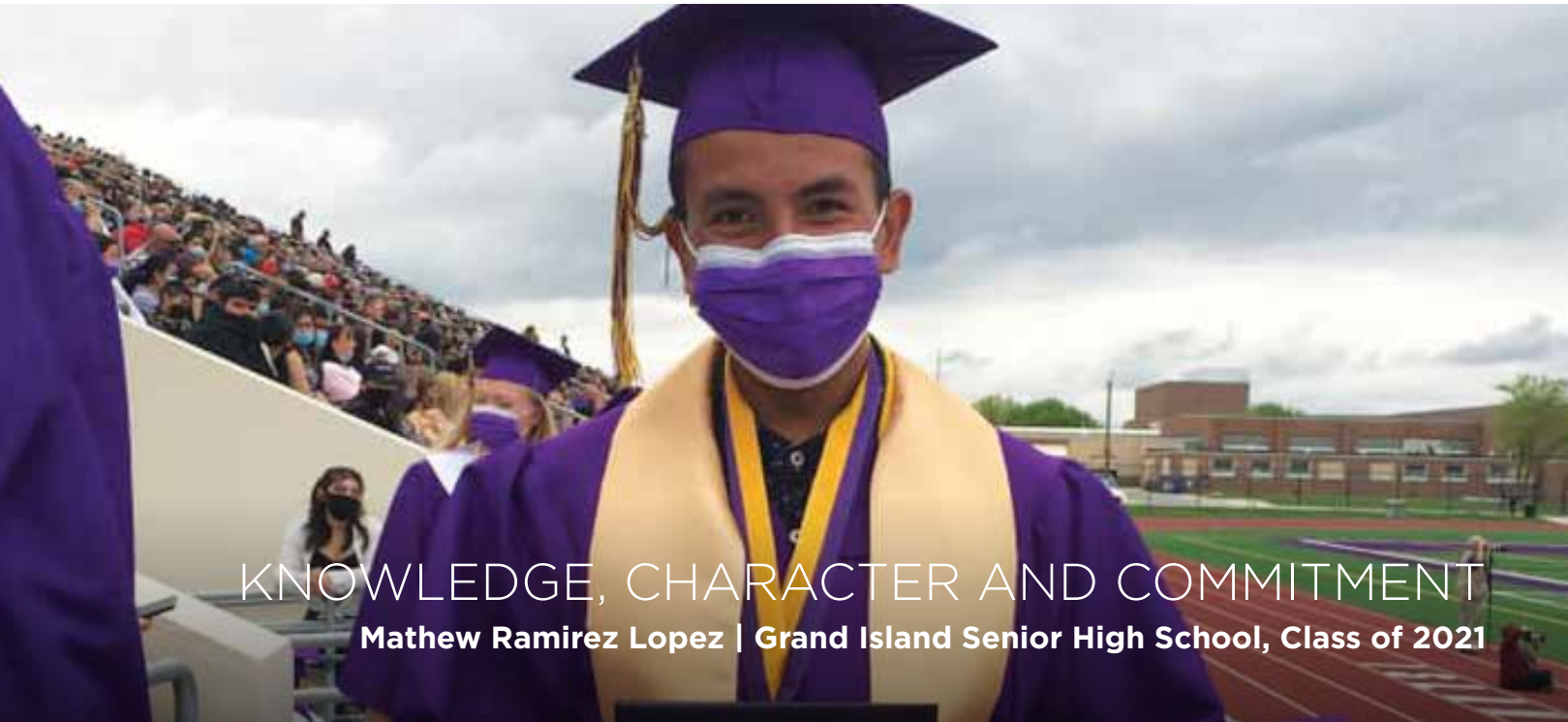

“My brother, dad and mom all immigrated to the United States from Bogotá, Colombia 20 years ago in search of a better life. Not knowing any English, they worked long shifts in a hotel to make ends meet. My brother went to school also knowing absolutely no English. I’ve always wanted to thank my family for everything they’ve done for me over the years. One of my biggest goals in life was to attend college without my parents going into debt. Thanks to NCPA, I’ll be able to accomplish that life-long goal.”

Mathew’s career plans include giving back to future students.

“I’m considering majoring in education and pursuing a career as a Secondary Social Science teacher. I desire to become a teacher because I want to show

future generations the importance of education and how it can greatly affect one’s life. By maintaining a positive and open environment in my classroom, I want to motivate all my future students to do well—not only my class but in life in general. I want to motivate my future students to be the best version on themselves.”

Like many NCPA Scholars, Mathew says the relationships are a highlight of the Academy.

“My favorite part about being in NCPA is all the new relationships and friendships I’ve made over the years. I’ve been able to meet some truly incredible people who have become great friends. NCPA has changed my life dramatically! Because of NCPA, I’ve had many great guides to answer my questions about planning for the future. The NCPA staff has truly helped me become the person I want to be. I would describe NCPA as

a whole new family, because that’s what NCPA is to me. Thanks to NCPA, I have been able to meet so many new people over the years who have helped shape me into who I am today.”

NCPA has helped Taylor McKesson learn to balance school and activities while working toward her goals for the future.

“The most important thing I’ve learned from NCPA is consistency. NCPA has helped me learn how to plan, stay organized and balance all my activities and school work. Outside of NCPA, I’m also on the Black Student Leadership Council, the Omaha North cheer team and I participate in track and field in shot put and discus. Because of NCPA, I feel more prepared for college because I’ve learned skills needed for college life. They’ve helped me with ACT preparation, applying for scholarships and learning about what to expect with college. My goals for the future include attending college, going to medical school and being a voice within my community.”

Taylor’s interest in the medical field came from seeing members of her family and community experience issues with mental and physical health.

“I hope to work in the healthcare or medical field, because I’ve always wanted to help people. I want to be a voice for those who need it the most in the healthcare system. I’ve seen so many health problems within my family, community and at Omaha North, and I want to give back. Because some members of my family have experienced heart issues, I’ve seen what people go through at hospitals, and I want to help families in that situation. I’m currently working on my Capstone Research Project about postpartum depression within the Black community. Throughout history, this issue has impacted Black women, and I think the medical field can improve awareness and resources.”

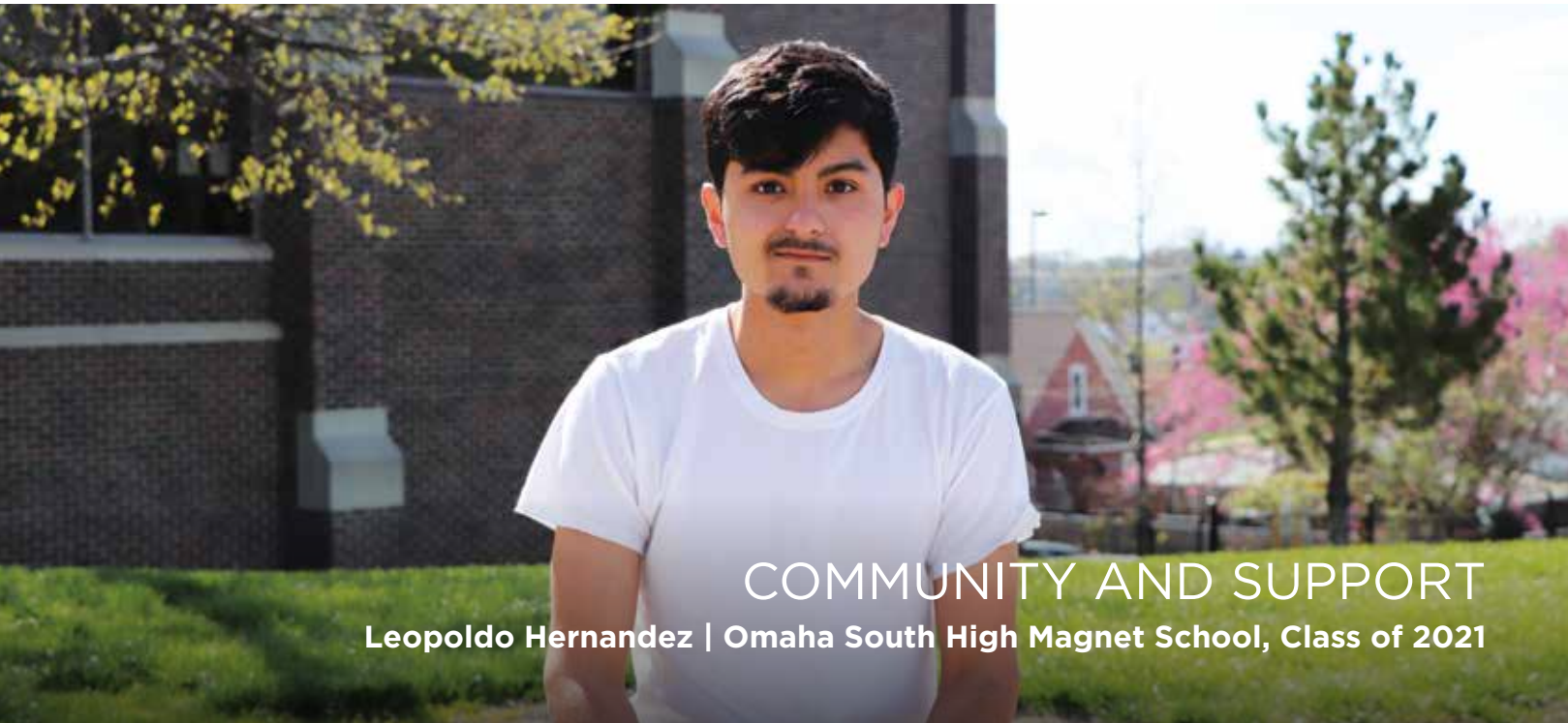
The NCPA community has supported and encouraged Taylor throughout her time in high school.

“My favorite part of NCPA is getting to meet new people and getting help with transitioning to college. NCPA has taught me that family, friends and peers are always there to help. With all the seminars, camps and helpful advice from teachers and counselors from NCPA, I learned that it’s okay to explore lots of different options when it comes to choosing a major. I am considering majoring in Computer Science because I enjoy writing code and discovering new breakthroughs. I’m also interested in exploring biochemistry, dentistry and other majors!”

The NCPA community has helped Leo learn to reach out to those around him.

“NCPA is a family, and they give you a chance to be successful. Meeting my NCPA peers for the first time during our freshmen year of high school changed my life. I got to experience a family-like atmosphere throughout high school, and I learned to reach out for help when I need it. My goals for the future are to study hard in college, then secure a job that pays well. I also want to enjoy my time in college by meeting new people, making new friends, and developing a passion for what I’m studying. I am involved with AIM Code School, where I learn how to edit a website from the ground up. When it comes to hobbies, I enjoy taking care of my plants and four fish tanks, listening to music and playing video games with my friends.”

NCPA helped Leo navigate the challenges of adjusting to life during the COVID-19 pandemic.

“NCPA is a program full of helpful and attentive staff. NCPA staff helped me overcome the challenge of social anxiety. Talking 1-to-1 with staff helped me rethink my ideas and change the way I act. Ironically, COVID-19 made me more of an outgoing person—I really appreciated all the meetings with my NCPA teachers. The social isolation, while remote, took a toll on my social life. I appreciated all the meetings with my NCPA teachers, counselors and mentors.”

NCPA has given Cherish Flyinghawk the motivation to succeed in every aspect of her life.

“NCPA helped me stay on a good path. It encourages me to make better choices. NCPA really changed my life because I have come a long way. I never thought I would be where I am today—planning to attend college. NCPA helped me overcome a lack of focus and motivation for school, and realize how important my future is. I used to think I would never become successful, but now here I am getting closer to the future I have always wanted for myself.”

More than anything, NCPA has helped Cherish realize her own worth and find confidence.

“When you know your worth, you can handle tough situations no matter what. I’ve learned that failing is not the end of

the world. You have to brush it off and try even harder. NCPA is like a family because they include every scholar and make them feel welcome. The staff and teachers are a really big support system to every scholar.”

By being involved, Cherish is preparing for her future—no matter what it holds.

“I am currently involved in National Honor Society, Student Council, FCCLA, Volleyball, Track, Softball and Speech. My future goals are to finish college and get a career that I am passionate about—I have been struggling between choosing education or nursing. I really like education and teaching others. I also like to help people, and one day I want to be able to come back to my hometown and help or teach people in my community.”

Now, Cherish is ready to make that future happen.

“I have learned that being an NCPA scholar isn’t about being smart, it’s more about working hard. You need to want to be successful and want a better future for yourself. Even when times are tough, just know that you can do anything you set your mind to. My favorite part about NCPA is being challenged and being able to handle the challenges. If someone was thinking about applying for NCPA, I would tell them that the most important part is to believe in yourself through every step of the way. NCPA helps you prepare for a better and successful future. It challenges you to work harder. It gives you more opportunities to do bigger and better things.”

SUCCESS THROUGH SUPPORT

Clarice Santos

NCPA scholars have proven educational success is achievable no matter the circumstances with the right academic and social support. What started as a pilot program 15 years ago continues to make an impact on the lives of scholars. We invite you to read what Clarice Santos—sociology and economics major from Omaha, Nebraska—has to say about her NCPA experience.

"One of the greatest legacies that my family has bestowed through each generation is their need to learn. Education is held in high regard within my family despite the limited chances that we've had to pursue it. As a result, I have always found myself surrounded by curious learners. They have always strived to find ways to teach themselves whatever subject catches their attention—law, mechanics, botany, ornithology and more.

My family created a space for learning by encouraging discussions and passing on their own knowledge to each other. This environment was an antithesis of their situation, as they have been discouraged to pursue the education they desire. As a result, attaining higher education is the

highest priority for me. I carry with me the sacrifices of those who have carved a path of opportunity to pursue the curiosities that I have inherited.

I think that first-generation students are susceptible to impostor syndrome. There is a sort of hyper-sensitivity to our lack of common knowledge regarding the college environment. However, because of my NCPA cohort, I was able to witness how others shared those same struggles and overcame them. The NCPA staff was also tremendously important as they have reassured me of my place on campus throughout the years—they created a space for me to belong.

The college environment is unlike anywhere else, and it's something that you need to learn how to navigate. NCPA is not just a scholarship to open your opportunity to attend college, it's also an amalgamation of people who will do their utmost to ensure that you will achieve the goals you've set for yourself during college."

For many NCPA scholars, preparing for college can feel stressful and daunting—for reasons in and outside of the classroom. Having people to reach out to and connect with during this process is key.

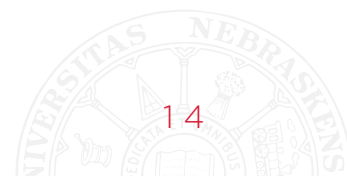

“NCPA changed my life by giving me hope and the opportunity to put in the work. Had it not been for NCPA, I don’t know if college would have been an option for me. They gave me the chance to better my life and maybe even make a change to the world as we know it. Attending college has given me a clear path to achieve my goals. It has also opened a new world of understanding for me. To me, the dedication that is required by NCPA has been entirely worth the opportunity they have given me. None of my hard work was in vain. All the work that NCPA has required has prepared me for college, and I am grateful for that.”

At Nebraska, Samuel's career goals and aspirations have grown and evolved.

“One thing that I really hope to accomplish during my life is to contribute in some way to the betterment and preservation of wildlife. I recently switched my major from Fisheries and Wildlife to

Computational Biochemistry. I may have switched my major, but I still want to contribute to the amazing world of wildlife. The field of research is constantly changing and evolving as new technologies get developed and as new information gets presented. I aim to one day be on the forefront of discovery and contribute to that change. More specifically, I aim to oversee my own team of researchers and focus on understanding and maybe even developing new ways to fight disease.”

NCPA's financial support has affected Samuel as well as his family.

“NCPA has positively affected my family by relieving the incredible stress that comes with worrying about money. Without this worry, my family has been able to focus on taking care of each other while I pursue a degree that will hopefully help my family in the future. My family consists of my mom and my two younger brothers. My dad got deported a while back, which left my mom to raise us on her own. All my life she has shown

me what it means to persevere, and her strength has inspired my own. When it comes to my brothers, I aspire to be someone that they can rely on, and I understand that the way I choose to live my life affects theirs. Family is one of the most important things to me, and that includes many of my friends who I also consider family.”

NCPA staff was always there to support and encourage Samuel, even while he was graduating from high school in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic.

“The NCPA and TFIOE staff have always been a great source of support for me. This has been a great help, especially during the events of this current pandemic. This gave me the opportunity to see how much NCPA cares about us scholars. During graduation season, they put so much effort into hosting a small ceremony for us, and they even did a drive-by graduation! Being a part of NCPA is a bit like having a coach for college. They truly push you to become the best you can be.”

“Attending college was always important to me because receiving a higher education was not an option available to my parents. As a first-generation student, going to college meant showing my siblings and nephew the wonders and ample opportunities that higher education can offer. As a Latina, going to college also meant an opportunity to be a representative voice for my Latino community, specifically in the healthcare field.

I hope to one day become a Physician Associate (PA), so I can participate in making healthcare more accessible. I hope to limit the disparities that many minorities face in healthcare by advocating for improved translation services and culturally appropriate forms of communication in healthcare.

I had never heard of the word college until NCPA introduced me to it. NCPA changed my life because it introduced me to leadership opportunities that have helped me overcome my fears, doubts and shyness. As an introvert, NCPA has helped me use my voice to speak out for what I value and to imagine making an impact in my community as an aspiring healthcare professional. Without NCPA, I would have never envisioned this career path, nor do I think I would be beginning my journey of becoming a PA this summer at one of the top ten PA programs in the nation.
