### **Foreword**

True to its land-grant mission, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln is committed to providing access to higher education. The Nebraska College Preparatory Academy (NCPA) is a testament to this commitment. I am pleased to report that NCPA had another terrific year.

During the 2023-24 academic year, NCPA celebrated 12 scholars who graduated from Nebraska. These graduates received an exceptional education and are entering their professional careers with a strong community of support without the burden of student loan debt. We continue to be inspired by the strength and talent of our NCPA scholars.

NCPA started as an innovative pilot program in 2006 with a cohort of eighth-grade students and has expanded into a model of college access. It serves more than 314 high school and 168 college scholars, impacting hundreds of students and families in Grand Island, Omaha North, Omaha South and Winnebago High Schools.

In addition to supporting the academic and personal success of our scholars, NCPA continues to develop and create tailored opportunities that can address the phenomenon known as the "network gap." It acknowledges that first-generation students are often less likely to have mentors within their social networks who can provide recommendations or give them substantial professional advice to leverage their education and secure a professional career. NCPA scholars connected with 50+ businesses from the Greater Omaha Chamber and the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce during NCPA's Opportunity Fairs. Here, scholars participated in career panels and received one-to-one mentorship, providing them with early career advice and potential entry into high-income generating fields. I invite you to read more on pages 14 and 15.

A trait that sets NCPA scholars apart is their commitment to serving the community. NCPA high school scholars and mentors completed 3,750+ hours of community service-learning hours during the 2023-24 academic year. Some projects included making 106 tie blankets for the Omaha Children's Hospital, 200 sack lunches for the Open Door Mission and 55 Winter Warmth Kits for the homeless shelter. We are grateful to NCPA scholars for their involvement in the community.

NCPA scholars excelled above and beyond the program goals set before them. NCPA college scholars were accepted into honors programs, earned recognition awards for serving in leadership positions and were actively involved in student organizations. Scholars averaged a 3.19 cumulative GPA, and 66 scholars in the fall and 74 scholars in the spring were honored at the Academic Excellence reception for earning a semester GPA of 3.5 and above. We look forward to welcoming 47 first-year college scholars this fall. The scholars will join the Trenchard Foundation Institute of Excellence, NCPA's four-year college support program.

The success of NCPA is a result of the commitment of scholars to their futures and the support of NCPA families, the University of Nebraska–Lincoln, high school partners and the many generous individuals and charitable organizations. Thank you for your continued support. Together, we are providing access to education and supporting the success of NCPA scholars in college and beyond.

# Through NCPA, Sophia Heminger has learned how to reach her goal of pursuing a career in psychiatry.

"The most important things I've learned through NCPA are for my future. If not for this program, I doubt I would know half of what I do now about college. It can be daunting to try and hunt down helpful information about what college and adult life is like. NCPA has shown me so many things and answered my questions, and for that, I am incredibly grateful."

## NCPA allowed her to meet new people and create a support system that helped boost her confidence.

"It has changed my life significantly. I used to lack general confidence in my day-to-day life, choosing to avoid being social. NCPA has brought so many people into my life. By interacting and getting comfortable with those people, I have become more social and confident in myself. More than that, my NCPA counselors have helped to create a happier version of myself."

# Being a part of NCPA has not only positively impacted Sophia, but also her family.

"NCPA has taken away a large amount of stress that a lot of families deal with. We don't have to worry about the means to pay for college, which is a big part of my future. Not only was my eldest brother in NCPA, but my little sister entered the program after me as well."

# The Pillars of Knowledge and Commitment helped Sophia deepen her dedication to create a successful future.

"Knowledge and commitment have always been a part of my life. I have dedicated myself to school, getting straight A's since I was little, studying and working hard. NCPA has given me a deeper value of character, including treating others how I want to be treated, being kind but not to being walked on and surrounding myself with good people because they impact the character I have."





## **Discovering Passion for Student Advocacy**

By being involved with student advocacy work, Michael Rieger-Hydar hopes to make a career in politics and improve the educational experience for everyone.

"I want to become mayor of Omaha, but that's my big goal. I will run for some sort of office no matter what. Campaigning alone can change people's lives, if you do so with good intentions. My hope is to leave people better than I found them, continue to spread positivity in our communities and make those same communities better and safer for people."

## Through NCPA, she's learned the value of hard work and perseverance.



## CliftonStrengths Help NCPA Build Success

Every year, first-year scholars in the Nebraska College Preparatory Academy (NCPA) complete a first-year seminar in which they take the CliftonStrengths assessment to identify their individual strengths and learn how they can help them in their respective fields. With better knowledge of their CliftonStrengths, scholars learn to leverage themselves in academics and career awareness, as well as engagement and well-being during college.

NCPA partners with the Clifton Strengths Institute (CSI) at the University of Nebraska–Lincoln and their Executive Director, Dr. Timothy Hodges, to offer and lead NCPA's first-year seminar.


"Transitioning from high school to college often brings big challenges," said Dr. Hodges. By focusing on scholars' inherent talents, CliftonStrengths can help build confidence and develop a personalized approach to the academic and social challenges experienced by NCPA scholars. "The seminar introduced scholars to their top five CliftonStrengths and how to apply those strengths in their relationships, coursework and future careers. We also explored other positive psychology topics including recognition, employee engagement and wellbeing. This strengths-based framework encourages self-awareness and positive self-regard, enabling scholars to navigate the complexities of campus life with resilience and purpose," said Dr. Hodges.

NCPA scholars have the opportunity to engage during weekly meetings, and they also receive a one-on-one coaching session from one of the Clifton Strengths Institute student coaches. These meaningful connections with peers and mentors help foster a supportive community that values individual contributions and empowers first-generation students to thrive academically, socially and personally, enhancing their overall college experience and success.

This past year, NCPA was recognized by CSI as one of two Strengths Partnership Award recipients. This award is provided to on-campus organizations that embrace and champion CliftonStrengths. "We are incredibly grateful for our partnership with the Clifton Strengths Institute", said Abel Covarrubias, NCPA Director. "Dr. Hodges is an expert CliftonStrengths coach, and NCPA is fortunate to have him leading our first-year seminar and helping our NCPA scholars understand how they can use their strengths to be successful on campus and in their future careers", said Covarrubias.







Despite achieving academic success, NCPA scholars experience challenges due to the "network gap." Affected scholars are less likely to have mentors within their social networks who can help them navigate their career paths. Without high-quality networking opportunities, NCPA scholars miss out on valuable mentorship that can provide them with industry knowledge, internship opportunities and professional development.

"NCPA recognizes that access to a high-quality network is essential for career development and advancement," said NCPA Director, Abel Covarrubias. "Through mentorship initiatives, we can ensure that students are not only prepared academically but also socially and professionally for the challenges of the modern workforce. By leveraging institutional resources and partnerships, we are innovating student experiences to prepare graduates for lifelong success and prioritizing participation and professional development for all Nebraska students."

To bridge the network gap, NCPA has partnered with Commitment to Opportunity, Diversity and Equity (CODE) through the Greater Omaha Chamber to offer unique experiences that meet the needs of NCPA scholars. CODE is focused on creating positive, measurable outcomes leading to increased opportunities and equity for underrepresented populations by collaborating with Omaha and Lincoln businesses.

This past academic year, NCPA and CODE partnered to host two Opportunities Fairs; one in the fall and another in

the spring semester. The Opportunity Fair connects NCPA scholars with businesses in the Omaha area, exposing them to potential internships and career opportunities. Over 100 scholars attended the Opportunities Fair in the fall and spring. In the spring semester, NCPA expanded this event and hosted businesses from the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce. A total of 50 businesses attended the Opportunities Fair including Hy-Vee, Streck, Local Art Plug, Edward Jones, Viterra, University of Nebraska Medical Center, United Exchange Dental Assisting School, Physicians Mutual, Hudl, Nebraska Medicine, Sandhills Global and the City of Lincoln.

NCPA scholars also attended the 2023 Conference on Opportunity, Diversity and Equity hosted by CODE. Attending the conference was a transformative experience for scholars, providing them with invaluable insights into professional development and the essential steps to thrive in their chosen careers. Engaging in workshops and panels, scholars learned about industry trends, effective communication and strategic career planning. The event fostered a supportive environment where scholars were able to connect with potential mentors, building upon their network that will guide and support them throughout their professional journey.

"College attainment alone is not enough to close the socioeconomic wealth gap which continues to disadvantage students from underrepresented groups," Covarrubias said. "By connecting NCPA scholars to business professionals, we can ensure that they have access to early career placement and entry into high-income-generating fields."

## NCPA Mentor Program Enhances Scholars' Community of Support

The Nebraska College Preparatory Academy (NCPA) Mentor Program aligns with the mission and goals of NCPA by assisting scholars in developing a community of support toward their futures.

NCPA mentors are current University of Nebraska–Lincoln undergraduate students, many of whom participated in NCPA and have completed the high school component of the program. Mentors go through an interview process and must attend a minimum of three events per semester to connect with their NCPA high school mentees. They also complete continuous training opportunities throughout the academic year which align with the NCPA Pillars of Excellence—Knowledge, Character and Commitment. This year mentors received training that addressed Knowledge—Tips for Sharing Knowledge and Shared Accomplishments, Character—Leading by Example and Professional Integrity and Commitment—How to Improve Time Management Skills and Communication Strategies, to name a few.

This past academic year, the Mentor Program gained new leadership through Claudia "Lulu" Diaz-Aldama. Lulu is an NCPA alumna who graduated from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in May 2022. As part of the NCPA alumni community, she found a passion for working with students, especially those who are first-generation or low-income. Since leading the Mentor Program, Lulu has found new ways to raise the bar for mentors and created several new incentives to improve mentor-to-mentee connections.

A new event introduced this academic year was the Mentor Matchmaking event. This event consisted of mentors and mentees participating in various "Getting to Know You" activities to help create more intentional matches between mentors and mentees. After each matchmaking event, mentees and mentors were asked to complete a matchmaking form with questions that would help Lulu identify which mentor would be best to pair with mentees. These events were successful and helped produce over 91 intentional matches.

These connections were fostered through additional NCPA Mentor Program opportunities that created a space to build community. Such outings included Vala's Pumpkin Patch, TreeRush Adventure Center, the Nebraska State Fair, TopGolf, Husker Football Game Day, numerous game nights and community service-learning events.



## NCPA Scholars in Research

The Nebraska College Preparatory Academy (NCPA) is always looking for ways to expand opportunities for scholars to develop and gain experiences that will improve their career outlook. One opportunity that NCPA is promoting among its scholars is research.

Data shows that participation in academic research can be a transformative experience both academically and professionally for students. By engaging in research, students can bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical application, which can help them foster a deeper understanding of their field of study. These hands-on experiences often enhance critical thinking, problemsolving and analytical skills, which are invaluable across various disciplines and career paths. Additionally, scholarly research can provide students with essential professional development opportunities. Through research, students often build close relationships with faculty mentors who can offer guidance, support and networks that are otherwise less accessible. These connections can lead to internships, publications, conference presentations and even future job opportunities, significantly enhancing a student's resume and career prospects.

Across campus, NCPA scholars can be found participating in several research opportunities, including the Ronald E. McNair Program, Undergraduate Creative Activities and Research Experience (UCARE), Summer Research Opportunities Program (SROP) and First Year Research Experience (FYRE).

The McNair Scholars Program aims to increase the number of underrepresented students in doctoral programs by preparing them for graduate studies, engaging in research with Nebraska faculty mentor guidance and developing relational skills critically needed for doctoral studies. For over four years, NCPA has had scholars selected to participate in the McNair Scholars Program.

"Being a McNair Scholar has provided me not only with an opportunity to have more experience in research but also provides me with the proper steps to be the first in my family to obtain a Ph.D. Because of McNair, I feel more prepared and secure in my path to pursue graduate school."

Other NCPA scholars have found opportunities through UCARE in which applicants write a proposal to conduct research under the guidance of a faculty mentor. Additionally, UCARE provides its participants with professional development workshops, two annual research symposiums and access to funding for travel or supplies. For Chris Nguyen, UCARE led to other hands-on experiences.

"After working with Professor Griffiths on my UCARE project regarding sustainable designs using engineered lumber, I was brought onto The Backloop: Curve Continuity and The Mizer's Ruin projects. Through this, I gained hands-on experience working with engineered lumber at the Nebraska Innovation Studios and on-site at Cedar Point Biological Station in Ogallala, Nebraska. Both were valuable experiences that improved my ability to work in architecture."

One NCPA scholar, Angie Gomez-Job, is creating a new path to research through the Summer Research Opportunities Program (SROP) offered through the Big Ten Academic Alliance. SROP aims to increase the number of underrepresented students pursuing graduate studies and research careers by helping prepare undergraduates through intensive research experiences with faculty mentors and enrichment activities. Participants engage in weekly campus-based activities to broaden their understanding of graduate admission procedures, financial aid opportunities, test-taking skills, preparing presentations and strengthening their technical skills. At the end of the summer, participants will present the results of their research project at a symposium on campus. Angie was invited to Pennsylvania State University to conduct research in Nutrition and Health Sciences.

The First Year Research Experience (FYRE) Program supports full-time, degree-seeking, first-year students who are eligible for work-study. Under the supervision and guidance of a faculty mentor, FYRE students participate in skill-building events and workshops as well as the interactive HuskerWork professional development program.

Students who engage in research during their first year typically have the opportunity to learn alongside faculty mentors and develop career-relevant skills. They also experience a sense of connection and community within a research team and gain knowledge about future careers and graduate study options. Students gain greater self-awareness and confidence in pursuing academic, professional and personal goals.

# From Childhood Influences to Scientific Aspirations


After growing up with the influence of people like Steve Irwin and shows like Go Diego Go, Samuel Aguilera-Robledo knew he wanted to go into science, studying cellular biochemistry.

"I chose this major because I wanted to find a way to stay involved with science and look at life from both a chemical and biological perspective. Growing up, I got to learn more about wildlife and became interested in preserving all the bits and pieces of life that inhabit the world around us."

To further his learning, Samuel wants to get a post-secondary education and work in a wildlife or athletics field. He's currently a sports assistant where he coaches 3–5-year-olds in organized athletics and has attended research conferences such as ABRCMS.

Then, if possible, I want to circle back and work with or establish a wildlife reserve and rehabilitation center."
